# Fun Facts about Dogs and Cats!!

Let's talk whiskers!! Here is a fun fact about both dog and cat whiskers you might not have known!

Dog whiskers have different names! The horizontal whiskers on the dog's muzzle are called Mystacial Whiskers, because they somewhat resemble a mustache. The whiskers on the dog's cheek are called Genal Whiskers. The whiskers that are under the dogs chin housed in a mole like spot are called Interramal Tufts. Last, but not least, are the whiskers above the dog's eyes and they are called Supraorbital Whiskers.

A cat's whiskers are so sensitive that they can detect changes in air currents, which helps them to maneuver in the dark. Inside your house, the cat's ability to feel the air flow around objects helps them avoid bumping into things. Outdoors, being able to determine changes in

the air around them can help cats escape from predators.
