Tips from our Trainer

When we talk about training, we're really talking about a relationship with our dog. In a good relationship, there is clear communication, reasonable expectations and willingness to compromise. That means we need to be aware of our dog's perspective, limitations, and abilities as we ask them to work with us. Dogs are not "stubborn" but they don't always do what we ask and there is a very good reason from their perspective. The most obvious reason is that they don't understand what we're asking them to do. For example, standing in front of your dog and asking for a "sit" is very different to the dog than standing behind him and asking him for a "sit". So it's important to train in many environments and situations as we teach a behavior. Another reason could be that they don't expect any benefit for complying. Dogs are opportunists and do what works for them. We don't need to offer a treat each time we get a behavior, but there are lots of other rewards such as praise, play, petting or even attention. As you get to know your dog, you'll know what works best for them. Another reason may be that they are uncomfortable with doing what you ask. Asking for a sit on a slippery floor or hot pavement may put the dog in a physically uncomfortable position. The point of all this is that we need to be genuinely aware of what is going on with our dog as we ask them to work with us. If we look for it, we can find a reason for how our dog is responding. That's the key to a good relationship and successful training.
