"I recently retired Sabre from Pets for Life. He turned 15 in May and unfortunately has had a recent change in his health that affects his mobility. He was due to recertify in August, so it made sense to officially retire at the end of the month after our August visits. He began with Pets for Life in 2012 after my first and longtime therapy dog, Gunner, and I began in 2010, so he has been enthusiastically "working" 13 amazing years. Gunner and I also regularly visited at The Gillham School and the TLC program. Sabre took over for Gunner at Crittenton Children's Center and Ozanam where we visited regularly after Gunner began visiting other PFL places and became a Pet Pal

at Children's Mercy Hospital. Sabre has also been visiting at Children's Mercy since Gunner passed in 2021. Both dogs were part of the R.E.A.D. program.

To witness countless adults and children relaxing with my therapy dogs, smiling, laughing and often opening up to us was very rewarding! I truly got so much joy from each visit and Sabre (and Gunner) adored being loved and giving love! They were extremely gentle and so sensitive to the needs of other people. During my 15 years with Pets for Life I was privileged to be part of numerous very special moments during our visits, some of which brought tears to my eyes. I have so many treasured memories! Pet therapy truly does make a difference in the lives of people.

This was a difficult decision, yet I know it is best for Sabre. I'll miss not only visiting and meeting people but engaging with the numerous PFL teams we visited with and the various staff who were involved where we visited as well.

## **FACILITIES** REQUSTING **VOLUNTEERS**

Ignite Medical Resort -Rainbow Blvd. is located at 3910 Rainbow Blvd, Kansas City, KS 66103.

Ignite is a rehab/therapy facility that would like to start all visits in the communal room. They will gather those patients interested in seeing the dog. There will also be some room-to-room visits.

Best time to make visits is Monday afternoon around 1:30 or Tuesday/Thursday morning at 10:00 am.

Kaw River Care and Rehabilitation is located at 750 Blake Street, Edwardsville, KS 66111 and offers skilled rehab and nursing and skilled rehabilitation.

Morningside Place is located at 6821 W. 81st Street. Shawnee, KS 66203. Morningside Place is a single-story building built around a fully enclosed courtyard. Their main common area, the Community Kitchen, comfortably seats about 30 residents.

They would like visits any day of the week—including weekends—between 10:00-11:45 AM or 1:30-4:00 PM.

ANEW Health is located at 6815 Hilltop Road, Shawnee, KS 66226.

ANEW is a facility for acute geriatric mental health care. Clients are typically experiencing depression and/or expressing suicidal thoughts. Volunteers sign in at the reception desk and will be accompanied into a nearby room for pet therapy visits. The room has a couch and chairs and clients will be escorted into the room in small groups (5 or less) for visits. Tuesdays and Fridays are not open to visits, but Saturday is a possibility. After noon or just before lunch (11:00) are ideal times for visits. ANEW is located on the ground floor of a new building in western Shawnee.
